

Request Summary

The Hoag Hospital Foundation requests a gift commitment of \$500,000* from The DONOR NAME Foundation for the Promotion of Science and Engineering. This gift will establish the Toshiaki Ogasawara Cancer Research and Innovation Fund.

Thank you for your consideration of this request. What follows is an explanation of how this gift will be used in advancing patient care.

Case for Support

More than 3,000 newly diagnosed patients seek treatment at Hoag Family Cancer Institute each year, making it the largest cancer program in Orange County. The Hoag Family Cancer Institute's commitment is to support the best possible outcomes through leading-edge care.

Under the leadership of new Executive Medical Director, Burton Eisenberg, M.D., Grace E. Hoag Endowed Chair, and in partnership with the renowned Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center at Keck Medicine of USC, Hoag Family Cancer Institute is undergoing an exciting transformation. Moving forward, our patient-centered care will focus on early detection, prevention, advanced therapeutics and translational research. Providing

advanced cancer care in a comforting, patientcentered environment remains the guiding principle as multi-disciplinary teams take a coordinated approach to developing sitespecific programs (e.g. breast, lung, colon) that incorporate the latest advances in the fight against cancer.



Hoag Family Cancer Institute's five-year survival rates beat the national average by a full 11 points.

Cancer care is evolving at an increasingly rapid pace. There has never been a more exciting or important time to invest in Hoag Family Cancer Institute. Under the leadership of Dr. Eisenberg and in partnership with USC Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center, Hoag is firmly positioned to lead the way in research and innovative new therapies that will advance patient care. Philanthropy will be critical to establish the infrastructure necessary to conduct such research as well as provide the discretionary funds to support innovative approaches to treatment and care.





Research

Clinical and translational research is at the heart of advancing patient care. In partnership with the USC Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center, Hoag Family Cancer Institute has a unique opportunity to participate in both translational and clinical research to contribute to the improvement of cancer care on a broad scale as well as offer the best treatment options to our patients.

Every cancer treatment and diagnostic tool that is used today underwent a clinical research study at one time to determine its efficacy, value, and safety. Clinical research trials allow hospitals and academic medical centers to test new oncology surgical methods, chemotherapy agents, radiation techniques, personally-tailored therapies, and novel combinations of these treatments. More so, such investigational therapies can also offer new options to patients whose cancer may be late stage or difficult to manage. The ability to carry out this important research and offer investigational treatment options to our patients requires a robust clinical trial infrastructure, which must be developed at Hoag Family Cancer Institute.

Translational research involves applying discoveries generated during research in the laboratory, and in preclinical studies, to the development of trials and studies in humans.



Hoag Family Cancer Institute and USC Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center are terrific partners to participate in translational research. Discoveries made in USC laboratories will be applied in a clinical setting at Hoag Family Cancer Institute. Findings will then be taken back to the laboratory at Norris to further refine and improve new treatment modalities.
